You'll notice these priorities in the text and in our cast. We have actors playing against traditional gender casting but haven't changed pronouns, made cuts to focus on the core of the story we want to tell and to open up the text

It's a good play, an important play in the history of the western theatrical canon - maybe the most important

to new readings and interesting complications to our own expectations and rote readings of a text that is pretty widely studied and 'understood'. We owe a lot of our exploration to this building, St. Luke's Mission, for inspiring us to think in new ways about our relationship to 'performance' spaces. This is especially important for artists in this city now, given how few dedicated 'traditional' theatre spaces exist or are accessible to us after the last few years. 




STEPHANIE HOPE LAWLOR *
